The early days with your new doggie are important—here's how to get it right. It's tempting to smother your new pet with love and invite friends and family over to do the same. "Some affection is nice, but give them time to just get settled," says Gary Richter, DVM, author of The Ultimate Pet Health Guide. Otherwise, you may overwhelm your pup and cause anxiety. Also smart: "Don't let them access the whole house at first," says Jeff Werber, DVM, president and chief veterinarian of the VCA Century Veterinary Group in Los Angeles. Puppies feel safer when they have a small area that is theirs. Once they get used to their surroundings and are house-trained, you can start trusting them with access to larger areas. 7-12 weeks is the best age for a puppy to be adopted. Earlier than that, pups should really be with their mom and littermates. 12-24 months is when a puppy will reach its full size. Following a routine can ease a new pet's anxiety and help you determine natural patterns. Feed your dog at the same time each day, and adhere to a walk schedule. In the beginning, lots of short walks are needed—experts suggest six to eight times a day (plus, take your pet out after each meal). Another thing to understand: Accidents will happen, and how you react matters. Yelling or scolding can be confusing and harmful to a puppy's development. "We think they understand that they're being reprimanded for going to the bathroom in the house, but to them, they're being reprimanded for just going, period," says Dr. Werber. Instead, give treats when they go outside to reinforce good behavior and no treats when they have an accident. You've likely done a bit of puppy-proofing—hiding electrical cords, gating off certain areas, that kind of thing. Watch your pup carefully for the first few days, and you'll be able to identify what you may have missed. Maybe he is drawn to your houseplant or gnaws on the corner of the coffee table. Paying close attention will allow you to make adjustments and cater to specific troublemaking tendencies. Bring your pup to your local veterinarian as soon as possible to confirm she's in good health and up to date on vaccinations. "Depending on where they came from, it's variable the kind of care they were getting," says Dr. Richter. He recommends bringing any paperwork you have from the adoption source so you can make a plan with your vet. The four core vaccines are typically administered four weeks apart, starting at eight weeks. A miniature (or mini) goldendoodle is a cross between a toy poodle and a Golden Retriever. They usually weigh anywhere from 15 to 35 pounds and typically range from 13 to 20 inches tall. Aside from their more compact size, goldendoodles aren't much different from their larger counterparts. They have similar personalities and many of the same care requirements, which are important to learn about if you're considering adding a mini goldendoodle to your family. Goldendoodles, including the miniature variety, make great pets, but they're not for everyone. One reason why is that they have tons of energy and need frequent exercise, so apartment living isn't ideal. They don't like extremely hot or cold weather, so if you live in an area where temperatures can get extreme and you can't provide a reprieve, the breed may not be for you. They also get along well with other dogs and, most of the time, if they've been socialized properly, they are friendly towards strangers. A goldendoodle's ideal home is one with a fenced-in yard to prevent the dog from getting out; the pup's need for exercise might cause it to run off. These dogs also prefer to live inside with their families — both human and dog — because they're quite affectionate and sometimes even a bit clingy. They often have separation anxiety, so they may be a better choice for people who work from home and can give their dogs more attention throughout the day. Mini goldendoodles usually have friendly personalities, which is one reason why they're so popular as pets. They are smart, easy to train and almost always extremely playful and active. Goldendoodles are loyal to their families and love affection — be ready to receive plenty of kisses and snuggles. While every individual dog is different, the hybrid breed is not prone to be aggressive toward people and other animals. This friendliness means they don't make very good watchdogs. They're also highly intelligent — the poodle is well-known for being one of the smartest dog breeds — so it's easy to train your goldendoodle to follow commands and even perform a fun trick or two. This combination of intelligence and obedience typically makes these dogs great service animals and therapy pets. Another reason why goldendoodles of all sizes are so popular is that they don't shed as much as other breeds and often don't aggravate allergies — keep in mind that there's no such thing as a "hypoallergenic" dog, so the breed could still trigger allergies if you're sensitive. However, they still need some grooming. Brushing a mini goldendoodle a couple of times a week will help keep its coat in good shape. Goldendoodles are typically clean dogs, and too much bathing can dry out their fur and skin. One bath every three months, unless otherwise necessary, is ideal. These dogs need nail trims about once every two months, and ideally, tooth brushings about twice a week. Finally, it's important to make sure a mini goldendoodle's ears stay clean and dry to prevent infection. The average mini goldendoodle eats about one to two cups of dog food per day. Unless your dog is inactive, you may want to choose a pet food that's higher in calories. Puppies need higher-calorie foods because they're growing quickly. Spreading your dog's meal times out or feeding two to four times a day can also help keep health problems at bay. Of course, you'll also want to make sure your goldendoodle has plenty of fresh water available at all times. Mini goldendoodles are typically easy to train, and they can benefit from obedience classes that help them learn commands and enjoy opportunities for socialization with other dogs and humans. One of your top goals should be to get your pup to walk on a leash so you can ensure it gets plenty of exercise daily. Some dogs may need more or less, depending on the individual pet. If your dog doesn't get enough exercise, it may become bored and resort to chewing up your belongings or acting out in other ways. Goldendoodles often like to swim, so if you have access to water, your dog can get some playtime in that way. While they're generally healthy animals, mini goldendoodles are at risk for potential health problems like any other breed of dog. Purchasing one from a reputable breeder can help ensure you're less likely to encounter genetic health issues in the future, but it can't totally prevent them.
